READ LUKE 5:27-32

Parties these days are next level. Wouldn't you agree? As a child of the 80s, I think back to the birthday celebrations I had as a kid. Most years were simply your run-of-the-mill soiree with cake and ice cream, a handful of friends, and a few party games my mom threw together with an assortment of basic craft supplies. I'm pretty sure we played some form of BINGO every year. There was, of course, that one time we branched out a bit, and my big sister put on a magic show for our audience of eight-year olds.

In 2024, however, are parties even complete without an Instagram-worthy portfolio of posted pictures to prove the existence of magnificently themed foods, over-the-top games, and darling decorations? If we truly peel back the layers of influencer-style intricate details, the most important element of a celebration is actually the reason for celebrating, right? There's no point in throwing a Sweet 16 if someone isn't, in fact, turning 16. A bridal shower with no bride-to-be would be peculiar. Or how about a graduation party where no one actually graduated? We'd have a group of terribly confused guests.

All Matthew needed was the love Jesus had for him. This was reason enough to celebrate. Because Jesus saw Matthew's value, regardless of his mistakes. Jesus carved out time to spend with Matthew, in spite of what others had to say about it. And He invited Matthew to follow Him and be His friend.

This week, you have been handed a unique responsibility to see and connect with the kids that cross your path. I assure you, they'll be ready for the party that VBS always is. But you might be the catalyst for helping them understand and believe that Jesus is a good reason to keep celebrating long after the week ends.

READ MATTHEW 22:1-14

Last year, we packed up our family of five and moved to a new city. After having lived in the same place for nearly a decade, it was a learning curve for us all as we transitioned to becoming anonymous everywhere we went. It felt weird . . .

- taking walks in the neighborhood without running into anyone we knew.
- attending school open houses at the end of the summer, minus our typical reunion with staff and faculty we had known for years.
- scooting in and out of the worship service at church without anyone stopping us to chat.

After having served on staff at a church for many years, that last one felt particularly odd.

In some ways, it was a welcomed change of pace after emerging from a lifestyle where our calendars were spilling over with invites and commitments. The anonymity was a breath of fresh air, but only for a season. Because eventually it felt lonely.

I think we're all wired to want the invites, don't you think? I'm convinced that even the most introverted of us still craves to feel included to a certain degree. I believe God created us with a need for belonging.

This will certainly be the case with the kids you see this week. While their words probably won't articulate it, their actions may give a glimpse of their deep need to feel like they belong. And you have the opportunity to help them believe they do.

Before you kick off Day 2, take time to think about a time when you were invited to something that provided you with that same sense of belonging. Was it your first job offer? Was it an invite to grab dinner with new friends? Maybe it was an acceptance letter to the college you were hoping to attend? How did you feel?

Jesus made it clear that everyone is invited to the party He's got planned. And you get the privilege of extending that invite to young ones you'll see this week. Ask God to help you know the right things to say and do that will draw kids in and help them feel invited.



CELEBRATE THE GOOD NEWS.

READ LUKE 15:11-32

I remember it like it happened yesterday. My husband sat in a chair next to me, as I lay on the examination bed in that dim ultrasound room. Our wide-eyed toddler curiously stared at all the computers and equipment, wondering if there were any buttons he'd be allowed to press. The technician did her thing, searching for that tiny blob that resembled more of a bean than a baby.

"Well, it looks like Oliver is going to have a little sister!" she proclaimed, and the room erupted with equal parts cheers and tears.

But only for a moment. Because we quickly heard that same voice gasp, "Oh, no!" The gigantic smile vanished from my face. My heart dropped. And I immediately assumed the absolute worst.

You see, I had only recently emerged from a painful journey of multiple miscarriages. The words, "Oh, no," in the ultrasound room were never an indication of news to celebrate. In fact, in my experience, they were only used to preface something devastating.

But just before the emotions evolved from heartbreak to hysteria, the sweetest of sentences turned our sudden mourning into dancing. "It's not a little girl! Oliver's going to have a baby brother!" So after sharing my sidenote advice with the technician to never EVER use the words, "Oh, no," in an ultrasound room, I transitioned back into celebrating the best news ever.

More than likely, you've experienced extraordinarily outstanding, life-changing news before, too. Maybe it wasn't a baby. But a promotion at work, perhaps? Or a notice in the mail stating you've paid off your student loans? How about that sizeable tax return check? The truth is, we've all experienced celebration-worthy news at some point. And if we've made the decision to believe in who Jesus says He is, then we have a reason to celebrate the greatest news every single day!

Today we'll be focusing on the forgiveness we receive through the ultimate sacrifice Jesus made on the cross for us. Sure, you'll probably find there are kids who've heard the story many times before. But it's likely you'll also come across some who are hearing it for the very first time. Don't hesitate to start an equally exciting party for both scenarios. (Much like whether you're discovering you're having a baby boy, rather than a baby girl.)

God's forgiveness will always be the greatest news we could ever celebrate! Take a moment to celebrate what He's done for you before you kick off Day 3, and pray for the conversations you will have with those around you.



JESUS IS THE LIFE OF THE PARTY.

READ JOHN 4:1-26, 39-42

Do you have that family member who is always the life of the party? You know the type. They're charismatic, witty, and uniquely gifted at making sure everyone has a good time. They have a matchless ability to bring fun to any festivities. Often, the party doesn't really even start until they arrive.

For me, this person has always been my older brother, Cody. And as we grew up, his presence took shape in various ways. After he left for college, the holidays became cherished parcels of time when the house would be filled with his loud voice and silly jokes again. There was that weekend he visited me in my freshman dorm at the University of Delaware. We attended a football game. Who do you think was found, running back and forth at the base of the student section, waving the blue and yellow flag to rally cheers from the crowd?

After Cody completed four years at the Unites States Military Academy, he was obligated to serve for five years in the Army. His first couple tours were no walk in the park, as he kicked off his commitment stationed at the Korean DMZ, and then Iraq. It would have been understandable if he opted to remain emotionally absent during those days of plowing through a complicated time on the other side of the world. The thing is, Cody has brought so much joy to my life, regardless of his location, simply because he has always helped me believe I matter. For me, that's all I really need in order to feel like I want to participate in any party. Don't you think we all need to feel that way, too?

Perhaps VBS Day 4 feels a bit daunting. You're wiped out. I'm certain the Samaritan woman who found Jesus at the well was tired, too. But Jesus has a unique way of helping us see our worth. And that can breathe life directly into our souls, giving us no other choice but to celebrate.

Take a moment to thank God for those "life of the party" folks in your life. And then ask Him for extra ounces of energy that come as a result of the life we're given when we have a relationship with Him.

READ MATTHEW 5:14-16.
